Harvest Festival took place at School. Year 5 did an excellent job in leading the service and our families donated food items into school as part of our Harvest celebrations. These food dona-



tions were passed onto The Good Shepherd, Wolverhampton whose mission is to create sustainable pathways out of poverty to end homelessness in Wolverhampton. Food donations were gratefully received by the Good Shepherd where their daily services include hot meals, showers, clothes, accommodation and user support programmes.

Later on during the Autumn Term, 3 members of the Spiritual Council went to visit The Good Shepherd to find out what happens with the donations. They were accompanied by Mrs Jackson and Mrs Hallam.

They were told that on average 170 individuals attend 3x per week for a hot meal and that 70 families, which includes 400 children, now use the food pantry on a weekly basis. These numbers continue to grow. There are over 40 volunteers who carry out a range of tasks.

Ayaan said, 'There is a thing called a family pantry and at the start of the week it is full but by the end of the week it is empty.'



Arwen said, 'It's really sad that so many people are in need for help though it is good that there are places like the Good Shepherd to help people.'

Mrs Jackson spoke with the school as part of our 'There is Room project' about how we can show through our actions that 'There is Room for God' at Christ-







mas. The three children who visited the Good Shepherd, used what they had learnt as part of the worship on 'There is Room for people experiencing poverty.'
